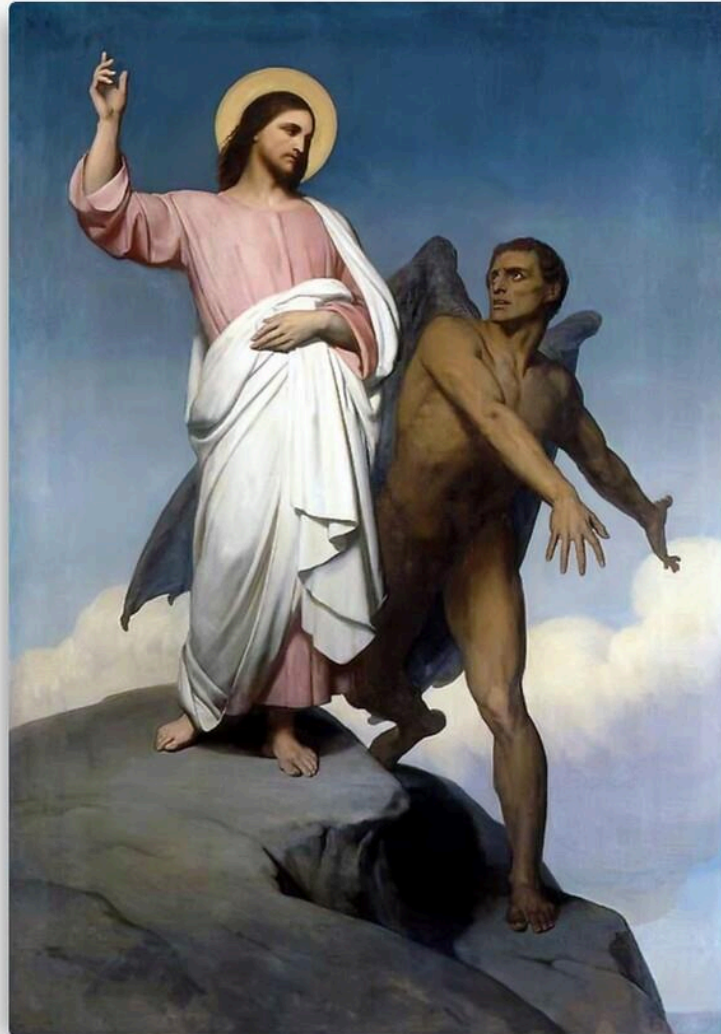

GATHERING IN GOD'S NAME

*The people stand as the choir, servers and clergy enter.
We sing together the Lent Prose as our Introit.*

Hear us, O Lord, have mercy upon us: for we have sinned against thee.

To thee, Redeemer, on thy throne of glory:
lift we our weeping eyes in holy pleadings:
listen, O Jesu, to our supplications.

**Hear us, O Lord, have mercy upon us:
for we have sinned against thee.**

The President greets the people:

Bless the Lord, who forgives all our sins.
Whose mercy endures forever.

The Lord be with you.
And also with you.

The President welcomes the congregation in suitable words then reads this sentence

We do not live by bread alone,
but by every word that comes from the mouth of God.

Matthew 4:4

Let us pray.

**Almighty God,
to whom all hearts are open,
all desires known,
and from whom no secrets are hidden:
cleanse the thoughts of our hearts
by the inspiration of your Holy Spirit,
that we may perfectly love you,
and worthily magnify your holy name,
through Christ our Lord. Amen.**

We say together:

**Lord, have mercy.
Christ, have mercy.
Lord, have mercy.**

During Lent, the ancient Hymn of Praise, Gloria in excelsis, is omitted.

Instead, we say together another ancient refrain, the Trisagion:

**Holy God, holy and mighty, holy and immortal,
have mercy on us.**

The President says

Let us pray.

The people pray silently, before the President “collects” the communal prayer in the prayer of the Church for the day and for the season.

Almighty God, whose Son fasted forty days in the wilderness,
and was tempted as we are, yet did not sin:
give us grace to direct our lives in obedience to your will,
that, as you know our weakness
so we may know your power to save;
through Jesus Christ our Redeemer,
who lives and reigns with you and the Holy Spirit,
one God, now and for ever. **Amen.**

Almighty and everlasting God, you hate nothing that you have made,
and you forgive the sins of all who are penitent:
create and make in us new and contrite hearts,
that we, worthily lamenting our sins
and acknowledging our wretchedness,
may obtain of you, the God of all mercy,
perfect remission and forgiveness;
through Jesus Christ our Lord. **Amen.**

THE MINISTRY OF THE WORD

FIRST READING

Genesis 2:15-17; 3:1-7

A reading from the book Genesis

The LORD God took the man and put him in the garden of Eden to till it and keep it. And the LORD God commanded the man, 'You may freely eat of every tree of the garden; but of the tree of the knowledge of good and evil you shall not eat, for in the day that you eat of it you shall die.'...

Now the serpent was more crafty than any other wild animal that the LORD God had made.

He said to the woman, 'Did God say, "You shall not eat from any tree in the garden"?'

The woman said to the serpent,

'We may eat of the fruit of the trees in the garden; but God said,

"You shall not eat of the fruit of the tree that is in the middle of the garden, nor shall you touch it, or you shall die."

But the serpent said to the woman, 'You will not die; for God knows that when you eat of it your eyes will be opened, and you will be like God, knowing good and evil.'

So when the woman saw that the tree was good for food, and that it was a delight to the eyes, and that the tree was to be desired to make one wise, she took of its fruit and ate;

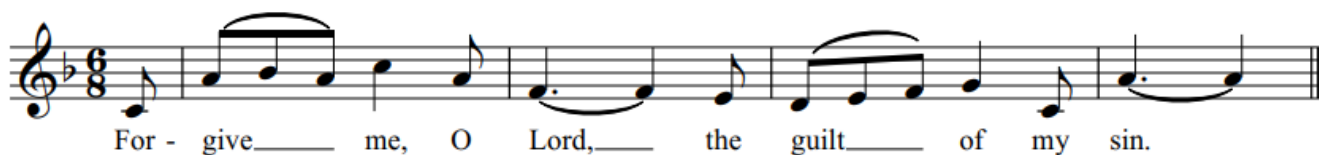
and she also gave some to her husband, who was with her, and he ate.

Then the eyes of both were opened, and they knew that they were naked; and they sewed fig leaves together and made loincloths for themselves.

Psalm 32

SECOND READING

Romans 5:12–21

A reading from the letter of Paul to the church in Rome:

Therefore, just as sin came into the world through one man, and death came through sin, and so death spread to all because all have sinned — sin was indeed in the world before the law, but sin is not reckoned when there is no law. Yet death exercised dominion from Adam to Moses, even over those whose sins were not like the transgression of Adam, who is a type of the one who was to come.

But the free gift is not like the trespass. For if the many died through the one man's trespass, much more surely have the grace of God and the free gift in the grace of the one man, Jesus Christ, abounded for the many.

And the free gift is not like the effect of the one man's sin.

For the judgement following one trespass brought condemnation, but the free gift following many trespasses brings justification.

If, because of the one man's trespass, death exercised dominion through that one, much more surely will those who receive the abundance of grace and the free gift of righteousness exercise dominion in life through the one man, Jesus Christ.

Therefore just as one man's trespass led to condemnation for all, so one man's act of righteousness leads to justification and life for all.

For just as by the one man's disobedience the many were made sinners, so by the one man's obedience the many will be made righteous.

But law came in, with the result that the trespass multiplied; but where sin increased, grace abounded all the more, so that, just as sin exercised dominion in death, so grace might also exercise dominion through justification leading to eternal life through Jesus Christ our Lord.

Reader Hear the Word of the Lord.

Gospel Acclamation

Matthew 4: 1-11

Praise to you, O Christ, King of eternal glory.

The Lord is a great God, O that today you would listen to his voice.
Harden not your hearts.

Hear the Gospel of our Lord Jesus Christ according to Matthew.

Glory to you Lord Jesus Christ.

Jesus was led up by the Spirit into the wilderness
to be tempted by the devil. He fasted for forty days and forty nights,
and afterwards he was famished. The tempter came and said to him,
'If you are the Son of God, command these stones to become loaves of
bread.' But he answered, 'It is written, "One does not live by bread alone,
but by every word that comes from the mouth of God."'

Then the devil took him to the holy city and placed him on the pinnacle
of the temple, saying to him,
'If you are the Son of God, throw yourself down; for it is written,
"He will command his angels concerning you",
and "On their hands they will bear you up,
so that you will not dash your foot against a stone."'

Jesus said to him,
'Again it is written, "Do not put the Lord your God to the test."'

Again, the devil took him to a very high mountain and showed him all the
kingdoms of the world and their splendour; and he said to him,
'All these I will give you, if you will fall down and worship me.'
Jesus said to him, 'Away with you, Satan! for it is written,
"Worship the Lord your God, and serve only him."'

Then the devil left him, and suddenly angels came and waited on him.

he ascended into heaven
and is seated at the right hand of the Father.
He will come again in glory to judge
the living and the dead
and his kingdom will have no end.**

**We believe in the Holy Spirit, the Lord, the giver of life,
who proceeds from the Father [and the Son],
who with the Father and the Son
is worshipped and glorified,
who has spoken through the prophets.
We believe in one holy Catholic and apostolic Church.
We acknowledge one baptism for the forgiveness of sins.
We look for the resurrection of the dead,
and the life of the world to come. Amen.**

we have not loved our neighbours as ourselves;
we repent, and are sorry for all our sins.
Father, forgive us.
Strengthen us to love and obey you in newness of life;
through Jesus Christ our Lord.**

The President pronounces absolution, and all respond
Amen.

Christ has reconciled us to God in one body by the cross.
We meet in his name and share his peace.

As our Saviour Christ has taught us, we are confident to pray:

Our Father in heaven,

hallowed be your name.

your kingdom come,

your will be done,

on earth as in heaven.

Give us today our daily bread.

**Forgive us our sins,
as we forgive those who sin against us.
Save us from the time of trial,
and deliver us from evil.
For the kingdom, the power, and the glory are yours
now and forever. Amen.**
