THE NAMING AND CIRCUMCISION OF OUR LORD JESUS CHRIST

I January, 2023

Reflection on Today's Feast

The feast we celebrate today has a three-fold focus. The oldest focus, as the most ancient title for today makes clear, is the circumcision of Jesus. It has been celebrated in both East and West since at least the 6th century. Likewise, it has always been kept on January 1st (the 'date' for Christ's nativity having been determined by then as December 25). In taking Jesus for circumcision on that day, Mary and Joseph, and therefore the child, show they were 'obedient to the Law' in bringing their son for circumcision on the 8th day (i.e., a week) after his birth. Circumcision, of course, was a sign of the covenant between God and Abraham, and all the people of Israel. Jesus thus is an embodiment of that covenant, but, as becomes clear in the earliest days after the resurrection, the sense was that, in Jesus, that covenant is extended in and through him to all people.

Secondly, given that the only gospel account we have of the circumcision comes in Luke's gospel, and that Luke links the ceremony directly with the naming of the child ("After eight days had passed, it was time to circumcise the child; and he was called Jesus..." *Luke 2:21*), the feast also commemorates the *naming of Jesus*. "Jesus" is, in fact, the Greek version of the Hebrew name "Joshua", and it literally means "YHWH saves". It reminds us not only of the hero of the Hebrew people who brought them into the Promised Land (as Jesus brings his people to the home promised for them), but also of the 'name' God gives in answer to Moses' question, "What is your name?": "I AM WHO I AM" (*Exodus 3:14*). And, later, God pronounces the name to Moses: "The LORD, the LORD, a God merciful and gracious... abounding in steadfast love and faithfulness..." (*Exodus 34:6*). In later centuries in the West, the feast of 'the Holy Name of Jesus' became linked to this feast.

Thirdly, since the Middle Ages, the focus on circumcision (and the necessary consequences of that procedure) has seen the feast honoured as marking the first shedding of Jesus' blood, (hence in icons, it is usually performed on what looks like an altar) and continuing the saving work of God seen in the Annunciation and Nativity.

As ever, the Eastern Church tried to represent the theological riches of the feast in icons - that always give us a glimpse not so much of earthly 'reality' (though there is that), but of the heavenly reality breaking into our earthly realm - just as in the Christ child earth and heaven are combined. Thus the two icons in this Order of Service show the child being brought to the rabbi or priest by his parents (and, in later icons, his grandmother Anne). Often, as well as the 'sharp implement' (or scissors - see p.18) necessary for the operation, another Jewish rabbi is present, holding the book of Law – a sign of the Holy Family's obedience to the Law. And, from earliest times, St Basil of Caesarea ("Basil the Great") has been shown in or near the scene, watching on. St Basil's feast day was also, traditionally, on January I (though it is now usually transferred to January 2). He, and the other great Cappadocian theologians – his brother, Gregory of Nyssa, his sister, Macrina and his great friend, Gregory of Nazianzus ("Gregory the Theologian"), were crucial in promoting an understanding of the full humanity of Jesus. It is therefore entirely appropriate that he appears in the icon as well: bearing witness to Jesus undergoing, as a fully human child, an important episode in our salvation. That we celebrate this Feast now on the day that begins a new year is also appropriate: remembering the first shedding of the blood that will mark, for us, the beginning of a whole new order, thanks to the faithful obedience of Mary, Joseph and the child who saves.

Lord Jesus Christ, only Son of the Father Lord God, Lamb of God, you take away the sin of the world: have mercy on us; you are seated at the right hand of the Father: receive our prayer. For you alone are the Holy One, you alone are the Lord, you alone are the Most High, Jesus Christ, with the Holy Spirit, in the glory of God the Father. Amen.

Collect

Let us pray.

The people pray silently, and then the President 'collects' the silent prayer:

God our Father, you gave to your incarnate Son the name of Jesus to be a sign of our salvation: may every tongue confess that he, who for our sake became obedient to the law, is both Lord and Christ, to your eternal glory; for he now lives and reigns with you and the Holy Spirit, one God, for ever and ever. **Amen**.

Let us together affirm the faith of the Church:

We believe in one God, the Father, the almighty, maker of heaven and earth, of all that is, seen and unseen. We believe in one Lord, Jesus Christ, the only Son of God, eternally begotten of the Father, God from God, Light from Light, true God from true God, begotten, not made, of one being with the Father; through him all things were made. For us and for our salvation he came down from heaven, was incarnate of the Holy Spirit and the Virgin Mary and became truly human. For our sake he was crucified under Pontius Pilate; he suffered death and was buried. On the third day he rose again in accordance with the Scriptures; he ascended into heaven and is seated at the right hand of the Father. He will come again in glory to judge the living and the dead and his kingdom will have no end. We believe in the Holy Spirit, the Lord, the giver of life, who proceeds from the Father [and the Son], who with the Father and the Son is worshipped and glorified, who has spoken through the prophets. We believe in one holy Catholic and apostolic Church. We acknowledge one baptism for the forgiveness of sins. We look for the resurrection of the dead. and the life of the world to come. Amen.

THE LITURGY OF THE SACRAMENT

The gifts are set up on the altar and the President offers prayers, to which the people respond:

Amen.

The President then begins the Great Thanksgiving Prayer

The Lord be with you. **And also, with you.**

Lift up your hearts. We lift them to the Lord.

Let us give thanks to the Lord our God. It is right to give our thanks and praise.

The President continues with a prayer appropriate to the season, concluding with:

... we proclaim your great and glorious name, for ever praising you and saying:

Holy, holy, holy Lord, God of power and might, Heaven and earth are full of your glory. Hosanna in the highest.

Blessed is he who comes in the name of the Lord. Hosanna in the highest.

The President continues the prayer until:

Let us proclaim the mystery of faith: Christ has died, Christ is risen. Christ will come again. The President continues the prayer, which concludes:

...we worship you, Father, in songs of never-ending praise:

Blessing and honour and glory and power are yours for ever and ever. Amen.

Silence is kept.

Rejoicing in the presence of God here among us, let us pray with confidence as our Saviour has taught us

Our Father in heaven, hallowed be your name, your kingdom come, your will be done, on earth as in heaven. Give us today our daily bread. Forgive us our sins as we forgive those who sin against us. Save us from the time of trial and deliver us from evil. For the kingdom, the power, and the glory are yours, now and for ever. Amen.

THE BREAKING OF THE BREAD AND THE COMMUNION

As the President breaks the bread, the following is said:

As this broken bread was once many grains that have been gathered together and made one bread, so may your Church be gathered from the ends of the earth into your Kingdom.

Together, we sing:

Jesus, Lamb of God, have mercy on us. Jesus, bearer of our sins, have mercy on us. Jesus, redeemer of the world, grant us peace.

Christ is the true bread which has come down from heaven. Lord, give us this bread always.

The clergy and people receive the sacrament. All who wish to come to receive communion are welcome. Please note: in keeping with current health advice, Communion will be administered in both kinds, but 'Intinction' (the 'dipping' of the host into the chalice) is not

permitted. (It is entirely appropriate to receive the sacrament in only one kind – the ancient and long-held practice of the Church – as the Church has always taught that full communion in the body and blood of Christ occurs in consuming either element.)

If you wish to receive a blessing rather than the sacrament, please come forward and stand with your arms crossed.


Looking ahead:
