(known as PALM SUNDAY)**



8:00 am and 10:00 am

LITURGY OF THE PALMS

At 10 am, when all are gathered, the choir sings:

*Hosanna to the son of David!
Blessed is he that cometh in the name of the Lord.
Hosanna in the highest. Amen.*

Words: Matthew 21:9
Music: Arthur Hutchings (1906–89)

The President begins:

Blessed is he who comes in the name of the Lord.
Hosanna in the highest.

The Lord be with you.
And also with you.

The President then addresses the people:

This morning begins the Great Week of the Christian Year.
During Lent we have been preparing by works of love and self-sacrifice
for the celebration of the Lord's death and resurrection.
With Christians throughout the world,
we come together this week to call to mind,
and to express in word and action,
the centre of the Easter mystery:
our Lord's Passover from death to life.
Christ entered in triumph into the Holy City
to complete his work as Messiah:
to suffer, to die and to rise to new life.
Today we commit ourselves to walk the way of the cross, so that,
sharing his sufferings,
we may be united with him in his risen life.

All hold up their palms for this blessing, said by the President:

Sovereign God,
we thank you for these branches and crosses of palm.
By your blessing may they be for us signs of the victory of your Son.
May we who carry them in his name ever hail him as our Messiah,
and follow him in the way that leads to eternal life;
who lives and reigns with you and the Holy Spirit,
one God, for ever and ever. **Amen.**

The Palm Gospel is read.

Matthew 21: 1–11

Deacon: The Lord be with you.

All: **And also with you.**

Deacon: Hear the gospel of our Lord Jesus Christ, according to Matthew.

All: **Hosanna in the highest.**

When Jesus and the disciples had come near Jerusalem
and had reached Bethphage, at the Mount of Olives,
Jesus sent two disciples, saying to them, ‘Go into the village ahead of you,
and immediately you will find a donkey tied, and a colt with her;
untie them and bring them to me. If anyone says anything to you,
just say this, “The Lord needs them.” And he will send them immediately.’
This took place to fulfil what had been spoken through the prophet, saying,
‘Tell the daughter of Zion,
Look, your king is coming to you,
humble, and mounted on a donkey,
and on a colt, the foal of a donkey.’

The disciples went and did as Jesus had directed them;
they brought the donkey and the colt, and put their cloaks on them,
and he sat on them. A very large crowd spread their cloaks on the road,
and others cut branches from the trees and spread them on the road.
The crowds that went ahead of him and that followed were shouting,
‘Hosanna to the Son of David!
Blessed is the one who comes in the name of the Lord!
Hosanna in the highest heaven!’

When he entered Jerusalem, the whole city was in turmoil, asking,
‘Who is this?’ The crowds were saying,
‘This is the prophet Jesus from Nazareth in Galilee.’

After the Palm Gospel is finished, the response is:

Deacon: Blessed is he who comes in the name of the Lord.

All: Hosanna in the highest!

THE PROCESSION

[The Procession occurs only at 10 am.

At 8 am, we sing hymn 511, then the service recommences on p. 6]

The President invites the people to process, saying,

Let us praise Jesus our Messiah,
as did the crowds who welcomed him to Jerusalem.

The Deacon says:

Let us proceed in peace.

In the name of Christ. Amen.

As the procession, led by the choir, moves to the church, the following hymn is sung.

(The refrain is repeated after each verse. When we reach the door of the church, we stop and a prayer is offered, before the procession continues into the church.)

*Refrain: All glory, laud and honour,
to thee, Redeemer, King,
to whom the lips of children
made sweet hosannas ring.*

1. You are the King of Israel,
and David's royal Son,
now in the Lord's name coming,
the King and blessed One. *Refrain*
2. The company of angels
are praising you on high,
and we and all creation
exultant make reply. *Refrain*
3. The people of the Hebrews
with palms before you went;
our praise and prayer and anthems
before you we present. *Refrain*

At the entrance to the church building (whenever we reach there) this prayer is said:

Merciful God,
as we enter this holy week and gather at your house of prayer,
turn our hearts again to Jerusalem,
to the life, death, and resurrection of Jesus Christ,
that, united with Christ and all the faithful,
we may one day enter in triumph the city not made with hands,
the new Jerusalem, eternal in the heavens,
where, with you and the Holy Spirit,
Christ lives in glory for ever. **Amen.**

The Procession continues:

*All glory, laud and honour,
to thee, Redeemer, King,
to whom the lips of children
made sweet hosannas ring.*

4. To you before your passion
they sang their hymns of praise:
to you, now high exalted,
our melody we raise. *Refrain*
5. Their praises you accepted:
accept the prayers we bring,
who in all good take pleasure,
our good and gracious King. *Refrain*
6. We pray, direct our footsteps
upon our earthly way,
and bring us by your mercy
to heaven's eternal day. *Refrain*
7. Within that blessed City,
your praises may we sing,
and ever raise hosannas
to our most loving King. *Refrain*

When all are in their places, the liturgy continues immediately with the Prayer of the Day, said by the President:

God of all,
you gave your only-begotten Son
to take the form of a servant,
and to be obedient even to death on a cross:
give us the same mind that was in Christ Jesus that, sharing in his humility,
we may come to be with him in his glory,
who lives and reigns with you and the Holy Spirit,
one God, now and for ever. **Amen.**

THE MINISTRY OF THE WORD

FIRST READING

Isaiah 50: 4–9a

A reading from the prophecy of Isaiah:

The Lord God has given me the tongue of a teacher,
that I may know how to sustain the weary with a word.

Morning by morning he wakens—

wakens my ear to listen as those who are taught.

The Lord God has opened my ear,

and I was not rebellious, I did not turn backwards.

I gave my back to those who struck me,

and my cheeks to those who pulled out the beard;

I did not hide my face from insult and spitting.

The Lord God helps me;

therefore I have not been disgraced;

therefore I have set my face like flint,

and I know that I shall not be put to shame;

he who vindicates me is near.

Who will contend with me?

Let us stand up together.

Who are my adversaries?

Let them confront me.

It is the Lord God who helps me;

who will declare me guilty?

SECOND READING:

Philippians 2: 5–11

A reading from the letter of Paul to the church in Philippi:

Let the same mind be in you that was in Christ Jesus,
who, though he was in the form of God,
did not regard equality with God
as something to be exploited,
but emptied himself,
taking the form of a slave,
being born in human likeness.
And being found in human form,
he humbled himself
and became obedient to the point of death—
even death on a cross.

Therefore God also highly exalted him
and gave him the name
that is above every name,
so that at the name of Jesus
every knee should bend,
in heaven and on earth and under the earth,
and every tongue should confess
that Jesus Christ is Lord,
to the glory of God the Father.

For the word of the Lord.

Thanks be to God.

Gospel Acclamation:

Praise to you, O Christ, king of eternal glory!
Praise to you, O Christ, king of eternal glory!

Christ became obedient for us, even to death, death on a cross.
Therefore God raised him on high
and gave him the name above all names.

Praise to you, O Christ, king of eternal glory!

*As always, it is customary to stand for the gospel.
Given its length, however, please feel free to sit if you need to.*

*(The Gospel is read by a group of readers: **N**arrator, **J**esus, one **O**ther reader and the **C**rowd.
Words spoken by the **C**rowd are read by **ALL** the Congregation and are in bold):*

- N:** The Passion of our Lord Jesus Christ, according to Matthew:
One of the twelve, who was called Judas Iscariot, went to the chief priests and said,
- O:** ‘What will you give me if I betray him to you?’
- N:** They paid him thirty pieces of silver.
And from that moment he began to look for an opportunity to betray him.
On the first day of Unleavened Bread the disciples came to Jesus, saying,
- C:** **‘Where do you want us to make the preparations for you to eat the Passover?’**
- N:** He said:
- J:** ‘Go into the city to a certain man, and say to him, “The Teacher says, My time is near; I will keep the Passover at your house with my disciples.” ’
- N:** So the disciples did as Jesus had directed them, and they prepared the Passover meal.
When it was evening, he took his place with the twelve; and while they were eating, he said,
- J:** Truly I tell you, one of you will betray me.’
- N:** And they became greatly distressed and began to say to him one after another,
- O:** ‘Surely not I, Lord?’
- N:** He answered,
- J:** ‘The one who has dipped his hand into the bowl with me will betray me. The Son of Man goes as it is written of him, but woe to that one by whom the Son of Man is betrayed! It would have been better for that one not to have been born.’
- N:** Judas, who betrayed him, said,
- O:** ‘Surely not I, Rabbi?’
- N:** He replied,
- J:** ‘You have said so.’

- N:** While they were eating, Jesus took a loaf of bread, and after blessing it he broke it, gave it to the disciples, and said,
- J:** ‘Take, eat; this is my body.’
- N:** Then he took a cup, and after giving thanks he gave it to them, saying,
- J:** ‘Drink from it, all of you; for this is my blood of the covenant, which is poured out for many for the forgiveness of sins. I tell you, I will never again drink of this fruit of the vine until that day when I drink it new with you in my Father’s kingdom.’
- N:** When they had sung the hymn, they went out to the Mount of Olives. Then Jesus said to them,
- J:** ‘You will all become deserters because of me this night; for it is written, “I will strike the shepherd, and the sheep of the flock will be scattered.” But after I am raised up, I will go ahead of you to Galilee.’
- N:** Peter said to him,
- O:** ‘Though all become deserters because of you, I will never desert you.’
- N:** Jesus said to him,
- J:** ‘Truly I tell you, this very night, before the cock crows, you will deny me three times.’
- N:** Peter said to him,
- O:** ‘Even though I must die with you, I will not deny you.’
- N:** And so said all the disciples.
Then Jesus went with them to a place called Gethsemane; and he said to his disciples,
- J:** ‘Sit here while I go over there and pray.’
- N:** He took with him Peter and the two sons of Zebedee, and began to be grieved and agitated. Then he said to them,
- J:** ‘I am deeply grieved, even to death; remain here, and stay awake with me.’
- N:** And going a little farther, he threw himself on the ground and prayed,
- J:** ‘My Father, if it is possible, let this cup pass from me; yet not what I want but what you want.’
- N:** Then he came to the disciples and found them sleeping; and he said to Peter,
- J:** ‘So, could you not stay awake with me one hour? Stay awake and pray that you may not come into the time of trial; the spirit indeed is willing, but the flesh is weak.’

N: Again he went away for the second time and prayed,

J: ‘My Father, if this cannot pass unless I drink it, your will be done.’

N: Again he came and found them sleeping, for their eyes were heavy. So leaving them again, he went away and prayed for the third time, saying the same words. Then he came to the disciples and said to them,

J: ‘Are you still sleeping and taking your rest? See, the hour is at hand, and the Son of Man is betrayed into the hands of sinners. Get up, let us be going. See, my betrayer is at hand.’

N: While he was still speaking, Judas, one of the twelve, arrived; with him was a large crowd with swords and clubs, from the chief priests and the elders of the people. Now the betrayer had given them a sign, saying,

O: ‘The one I will kiss is the man; arrest him.’

N: At once he came up to Jesus and said,

O: ‘Greetings, Rabbi!’

N: and kissed him. Jesus said to him,

J: ‘Friend, do what you are here to do.’

N: Then they came and laid hands on Jesus and arrested him. Suddenly, one of those with Jesus put his hand on his sword, drew it, and struck the slave of the high priest, cutting off his ear. Then Jesus said to him,

J: ‘Put your sword back into its place; for all who take the sword will perish by the sword. Do you think that I cannot appeal to my Father, and he will at once send me more than twelve legions of angels? But how then would the scriptures be fulfilled, which say it must happen in this way?’

N: At that hour Jesus said to the crowds,

J: ‘Have you come out with swords and clubs to arrest me as though I were a bandit? Day after day I sat in the temple teaching, and you did not arrest me. But all this has taken place, so that the scriptures of the prophets may be fulfilled.’

N: Then all the disciples deserted him and fled. Those who had arrested Jesus took him to Caiaphas the high priest, in whose house the scribes and the elders had gathered. But Peter was following him at a distance, as far as the courtyard of the high priest; and going inside, he sat with the guards in order to see how this would end.

Now the chief priests and the whole council were looking for false testimony against Jesus so that they might put him to death, but they found none, though many false witnesses came forward. At last two came forward and said, 'This fellow said,

O: "I am able to destroy the temple of God and to build it in three days."

N: The high priest stood up and said,

O: 'Have you no answer? What is it that they testify against you?'

N: But Jesus was silent. Then the high priest said to him,

O: 'I put you under oath before the living God, tell us if you are the Messiah, the Son of God.'

N: Jesus said to him,

J: 'You have said so. But I tell you,
From now on you will see the Son of Man
seated at the right hand of Power
and coming on the clouds of heaven.'

N: Then the high priest tore his clothes and said,

O: 'He has blasphemed! Why do we still need witnesses? You have now heard his blasphemy. What is your verdict?'

C: **They answered, 'He deserves death.'**

N: Then they spat in his face and struck him; and some slapped him, saying,

C: **'Prophecy to us, you Messiah! Who is it that struck you?'**

N: Now Peter was sitting outside in the courtyard. A servant-girl came to him and said,

O: 'You also were with Jesus the Galilean.'

N: But he denied it before all of them, saying,

O: 'I do not know what you are talking about.'

N: When he went out to the porch, another servant-girl saw him, and she said to the bystanders,

O: 'This man was with Jesus of Nazareth.'

N: Again he denied it with an oath,

O: 'I do not know the man.'

N: After a little while the bystanders came up and said to Peter,

C: **'Certainly you are also one of them, for your accent betrays you.'**

N: Then he began to curse, and he swore an oath,

O: 'I do not know the man!'

N: At that moment the cock crowed. Then Peter remembered what Jesus had said: 'Before the cock crows, you will deny me three times.' And he went out and wept bitterly.

When morning came, all the chief priests and the elders of the people conferred together against Jesus in order to bring about his death. They bound him, led him away, and handed him over to Pilate the governor.

When Judas, his betrayer, saw that Jesus was condemned, he repented and brought back the thirty pieces of silver to the chief priests and the elders. He said,

O: I have sinned by betraying innocent blood.'

N: But they said,

C: **'What is that to us? See to it yourself.'**

N: Throwing down the pieces of silver in the temple, he departed; and he went and hanged himself. But the chief priests, taking the pieces of silver, said,

C: **'It is not lawful to put them into the treasury, since they are blood money.'**

N: After conferring together, they used them to buy the potter's field as a place to bury foreigners. For this reason that field has been called the Field of Blood to this day. Then was fulfilled what had been spoken through the prophet Jeremiah, 'And they took the thirty pieces of silver, the price of the one on whom a price had been set, on whom some of the people of Israel had set a price, and they gave them for the potter's field, as the Lord commanded me.'

Now Jesus stood before the governor; and the governor asked him,

O: 'Are you the King of the Jews?'

N: Jesus said,

J: 'You say so.'

N: But when he was accused by the chief priests and elders, he did not answer. Then Pilate said to him,

O: 'Do you not hear how many accusations they make against you?'

N: But he gave him no answer, not even to a single charge, so that the governor was greatly amazed.

Now at the festival the governor was accustomed to release a prisoner for the crowd, anyone whom they wanted. At that time they had a notorious prisoner, called Jesus Barabbas. So after they had gathered, Pilate said to them,

O: ‘Whom do you want me to release for you, Jesus Barabbas or Jesus who is called the Messiah?’

N: For he realized that it was out of jealousy that they had handed him over. While he was sitting on the judgement seat, his wife sent word to him,

O: ‘Have nothing to do with that innocent man, for today I have suffered a great deal because of a dream about him.’

N: Now the chief priests and the elders persuaded the crowds to ask for Barabbas and to have Jesus killed. The governor again said to them,

O: ‘Which of the two do you want me to release for you?’ And they said,

C: **‘Barabbas.’**

N: Pilate said to them,

O: ‘Then what should I do with Jesus who is called the Messiah?’ All of them said,

C: **‘Let him be crucified!’**

N: Then he asked,

O: ‘Why, what evil has he done?’

N: But they shouted all the more,

C: **‘Let him be crucified!’**

N: So when Pilate saw that he could do nothing, but rather that a riot was beginning, he took some water and washed his hands before the crowd, saying,

O: ‘I am innocent of this man’s blood; see to it yourselves.’

N: Then the people as a whole answered,

C: **‘His blood be on us and on our children!’**

N: So he released Barabbas for them; and after flogging Jesus, he handed him over to be crucified.

Then the soldiers of the governor took Jesus into the governor’s headquarters, and they gathered the whole cohort around him. They stripped him and put a scarlet robe on him, and after twisting some thorns

into a crown, they put it on his head. They put a reed in his right hand and knelt before him and mocked him, saying,

C: ‘Hail, King of the Jews!’

N: They spat on him, and took the reed and struck him on the head. After mocking him, they stripped him of the robe and put his own clothes on him. Then they led him away to crucify him.

As they went out, they came upon a man from Cyrene named Simon; they compelled this man to carry his cross. And when they came to a place called Golgotha (which means Place of a Skull), they offered him wine to drink, mixed with gall; but when he tasted it, he would not drink it. And when they had crucified him, they divided his clothes among themselves by casting lots; then they sat down there and kept watch over him. Over his head they put the charge against him, which read, ‘This is Jesus, the King of the Jews.’ Then two bandits were crucified with him, one on his right and one on his left.

Those who passed by derided him, shaking their heads and saying,

C: ‘You who would destroy the temple and build it in three days, save yourself! If you are the Son of God, come down from the cross.’

N: In the same way the chief priests also, along with the scribes and elders, were mocking him, saying,

C: ‘He saved others; he cannot save himself. He is the King of Israel; let him come down from the cross now, and we will believe in him. He trusts in God; let God deliver him now, if he wants to; for he said, “I am God’s Son.” ’

N: The bandits who were crucified with him also taunted him in the same way.

From noon on, darkness came over the whole land until three in the afternoon. And about three o’clock Jesus cried with a loud voice,

J: ‘Eli, Eli, lema sabachthani?’

N: that is, ‘My God, my God, why have you forsaken me?’ When some of the bystanders heard it, they said,

C: ‘This man is calling for Elijah.’

N: At once one of them ran and got a sponge, filled it with sour wine, put it on a stick, and gave it to him to drink. But the others said,

C: ‘Wait, let us see whether Elijah will come to save him.’

N: Then Jesus cried again with a loud voice and breathed his last.

All kneel and pause a moment

N: At that moment the curtain of the temple was torn in two, from top to bottom. The earth shook, and the rocks were split. The tombs also were opened, and many bodies of the saints who had fallen asleep were raised. After his resurrection they came out of the tombs and entered the holy city and appeared to many.

Now when the centurion and those with him, who were keeping watch over Jesus, saw the earthquake and what took place, they were terrified and said,

C: **‘Truly this man was God’s Son!’**

N: Many women were also there, looking on from a distance; they had followed Jesus from Galilee and had provided for him. Among them were Mary Magdalene, and Mary the mother of James and Joseph, and the mother of the sons of Zebedee.

When it was evening, there came a rich man from Arimathea, named Joseph, who was also a disciple of Jesus. He went to Pilate and asked for the body of Jesus; then Pilate ordered it to be given to him. So Joseph took the body and wrapped it in a clean linen cloth and laid it in his own new tomb, which he had hewn in the rock. He then rolled a great stone to the door of the tomb and went away. Mary Magdalene and the other Mary were there, sitting opposite the tomb.

The next day, that is, after the day of Preparation, the chief priests and the Pharisees gathered before Pilate and said,

C: **‘Sir, we remember what that impostor said while he was still alive, “After three days I will rise again.” Therefore command that the tomb be made secure until the third day; otherwise his disciples may go and steal him away, and tell the people, “He has been raised from the dead”, and the last deception would be worse than the first.’**

N: Pilate said to them,

O: ‘You have a guard of soldiers; go, make it as secure as you can.’ So they went with the guard and made the tomb secure by sealing the stone.

No response is made to the gospel on this day.

There is no sermon today, as we reflect in silence on the Passion just heard.

After a long pause for reflection, we move directly to

THE PRAYERS OF THE PEOPLE

The Prayers are offered with the following response:

Lord, hear us.

Lord, hear our prayer.

The President concludes with this prayer:

Holy God,
hear the prayers of your Church.
Forgive our sins,
and send us the grace we need
to be faithful followers of our crucified and risen Lord,
for we pray in Jesus' name. **Amen.**

CONFESSION AND ABSOLUTION

Deacon: God shows great love for us in that while we were still sinners
Christ died for us.

Silence is kept.

Let us then confess our sins in penitence and faith.

All: Merciful God,
our maker and our judge,
we have sinned against you in thought, word, and deed,
and in what we have failed to do:
we have not loved you with our whole heart;
we have not loved our neighbours as ourselves;
we repent, and are sorry for all our sins.
Father, forgive us.
Strengthen us to love and obey you in newness of life;
through Jesus Christ our Lord. Amen.

The President pronounces Absolution, to which all reply:

Amen.

THE GREETING OF PEACE

President: Christ has reconciled us to God in one body by the cross.

All: **We meet in his name and share his peace.**

The peace of the Lord be always with you.

And also with you.

All exchange a greeting of peace.

While the Table is prepared, the following hymn is sung:

THE GREAT THANKSGIVING

The Lord be with you.

And also with you.

Lift up your hearts.

We lift them to the Lord.

Let us give thanks to the Lord our God.

It is right to give our thanks and praise.

The President continues singing a prayer recalling God's saving acts, culminating with:

Therefore with angels and archangels
and with all the company of heaven,
we proclaim your great and glorious name,
for ever praising you and saying:

**Holy, holy, holy, Lord,
God of power and might,
Heaven and earth are full of your glory.
Hosanna in the highest.**

**Blessed is he who comes in the name of the Lord.
Hosanna in the highest.**

The prayer continues recalling the Supper our Lord shared with his disciples until we say or sing:

**Save us, Saviour of the world.
For by your death and resurrection you have set us free.**

The prayer concludes with a triumphant song of praise:

**Blessing and honour and glory and power
are yours for ever and ever. Amen.**

Silence is kept.

As our Saviour Christ has taught us, we are confident to pray,

**Our Father in heaven, hallowed be your name,
your kingdom come,
your will be done,
on earth as in heaven.**

Give us today our daily bread.

**Forgive us our sins
as we forgive those who sin against us.**

**Save us from the time of trial
and deliver us from evil.**

**For the kingdom, the power,
and the glory are yours now and for ever. Amen.**

THE BREAKING OF THE BREAD AND THE COMMUNION

The President breaks the bread, then says

Unless a grain of wheat falls into the ground and dies,
