


SOLEMN CHORAL EVENSONG FOR THE FEAST OF ALL SAINTS



November 5, 2023 6:00 p.m.

All stand as the Choir and Ministers enter.

A sentence of Scripture appropriate to the day is read, or an Introit is sung.

The Minister then says:

Priest: O Lord, open thou our lips.

Answer: And our mouth shall shew forth thy praise.

Priest: O God, make speed to save us.

Answer: O Lord, make haste to help us.

Here, all standing up, the Priest shall say,

Glory be to the Father, and to the Son, and to the Holy Ghost; As it was in the beginning, is now, and ever shall be, world without end. Amen.

Praise ye the Lord.

The Lord's Name be praised.

Preces and Responses: Plainchant

Then shall be sung the Psalms as be appointed, by the choir. The people sit.

PSALM 33

Exultate, justi

- I. REJOICE in the Lord, O ye righteous: for it becometh well the just to be thankful.
- 2. Praise the Lord with harp: sing praises unto him with the lute and instrument of ten strings.
- 3. Sing unto the Lord a new song : sing praises lustily unto him with a good courage.
- 4. For the word of the Lord is true: and all his works are faithful.
- 5. He loveth righteousness and judgement: the earth is full of the goodness of the Lord.
- 6. By the word of the Lord were the heavens made: and all the hosts of them by the breath of his mouth.
- 7. He gathereth the waters of the sea together, as it were upon an heap: and layeth up the deep, as in a treasure-house.

- 8. Let all the earth fear the Lord : stand in awe of him, all ye that dwell in the world.
- 9. For he spake, and it was done: he commanded, and it stood fast.

- 13. The Lord looked down from heaven, and beheld all the children of men: from the habitation of his dwelling he considereth all them that dwell on the earth.
- 14. He fashioneth all the hearts of them: and understandeth all their works.
- 15. There is no king that can be saved by the multitude of an host: neither is any mighty man delivered by much strength.
- 16. A horse is counted but a vain thing to save a man: neither shall he deliver any man by his great strength.
- 17. Behold, the eye of the Lord is upon them that fear him : and upon them that put their trust in his mercy;
- 18. To deliver their soul from death: and to feed them in the time of dearth.
- 19. Our soul hath patiently tarried for the Lord : for he is our help and our shield.
- 20. For our heart shall rejoice in him: because we have hoped in his holy Name.
- 21. Let thy merciful kindness, O Lord, be upon us: like as we do put our trust in thee.

Then a Lesson of the Old Testament, as is appointed.

Here begins the 44th chapter of the book Sirach:

Let us now sing the praises of the famous, our ancestors in their generations. The Lord apportioned to them great glory, his majesty from the beginning. There were those who ruled in their kingdoms, and made a name for themselves by their valour; those who gave counsel because they were intelligent; those who spoke in prophetic oracles; those who led the people by their counsels and by their knowledge of the people's lore; they were wise in their words of instruction; those who composed musical tunes, or put verses in writing; rich people endowed with resources, living peacefully in their homes all these were honoured in their generations, and were the pride of their times. Some of them have left behind a name, so that others declare their praise. But of others there is no memory; they have perished as though they had never existed; they have become as though they had never been born, they and their children after them. But these also were godly people, whose righteous deeds have not been forgotten; their wealth will remain with their descendants,

and their inheritance with their children's children.

Their descendants stand by the covenants; their children also, for their sake.

Their offspring will continue for ever, and their glory will never be blotted out.

Their bodies are buried in peace, but their name lives on generation after generation.

The assembly declares their wisdom, and the congregation proclaims their praise.

Sirach 44:1-15

Here ends the first lesson.

All stand for the Office Hymn:

- I Father, in whom thy saints are one, bought by the blood of thy dear Son, we praise thee for thy hallowing grace in those who now behold thy face.
- 2 For they have gained eternal rest, and in the heavenly mansions blest they dwell among the angelic throng, and hear the one unending song.
- The patriarchs and prophets old the heavenly splendour now behold; the Baptist, herald of thy Son, enjoys the fruit of labour done.
- 4 But first among the saintly band, the Mother, at her Son's right hand, adores the Saviour's endless love, in that eternal home above.
- The twelve now see the Father's face, while all who've run their earthly race in one glad company rejoice to hear the heavenly bridegroom's voice.

- 6 Father of all, to thee we pray, keep us for ever in the way that leads us to the heavenly rest among the glories of the blest.
- 7 To God the Father, God the Son, and God the Spirit, Three in One, all worship, love and honour be, both now and in eternity.

And after that Magnificat (or the Song of the Blessed Virgin Mary) is sung by the choir in English, as followeth, all still standing.

Then a Lesson of the New Testament, as it is appointed.

Here begins the 19th chapter of the Revelation to John:

After this I heard what seemed to be the loud voice of a great multitude in heaven, saying,

'Hallelujah!

Salvation and glory and power to our God, for his judgements are true and just; he has judged the great whore who corrupted the earth with her fornication, and he has avenged on her the blood of his servants.'

Once more they said,

'Hallelujah!

The smoke goes up from her for ever and ever.'

And the twenty-four elders and the four living creatures fell down and worshipped God who is seated on the throne, saying, 'Amen. Hallelujah!'

And from the throne came a voice saying,

'Praise our God, all you his servants, and all who fear him, small and great.'

Then I heard what seemed to be the voice of a great multitude, like the sound of many waters and like the sound of mighty thunder-peals, crying out,

'Hallelujah!

For the Lord our God the Almighty reigns.

Let us rejoice and exult and give him the glory,
for the marriage of the Lamb has come,
and his bride has made herself ready;
to her it has been granted to be clothed
with fine linen, bright and pure'—
for the fine linen is the righteous deeds of the saints.

And the angel said to me,

'Write this:

Blessed are those who are invited to the marriage supper of the Lamb.' And he said to me, 'These are true words of God.'

Then I fell down at his feet to worship him, but he said to me,

'You must not do that! I am a fellow-servant with you and your comrades who hold the testimony of Jesus. Worship God! For the testimony of Jesus is the spirit of prophecy.'

Revelation 19:1-10

Here ends the second lesson.

And after that Nunc dimittis (or the Song of Simeon), as followeth, all standing.

LORD, now lettest thou thy servant depart in peace : according to thy word.

For mine eyes have seen:

thy salvation;

Which thou hast prepared:

before the face of all people;

To be a light to lighten the Gentiles:

and to be the glory of thy people Israel.

Glory be to the Father, and to the Son:

and to the Holy Ghost;

As it was in the beginning, is now, and ever shall be:

world without end. Amen.

Setting: Carolus Andreas (1632-1704)

Then shall be said or sung the Apostles' Creed, by the Minister and the people standing, and facing east.

I BELIEVE in God the Father Almighty,

Maker of heaven and earth:

And in Jesus Christ his only Son our Lord,
Who was conceived by the Holy Ghost,
Born of the Virgin Mary,
Suffered under Pontius Pilate,
Was crucified, dead, and buried:
He descended into hell;
The third day he rose again from the dead;
He ascended into heaven,
And sitteth on the right hand of God the Father Almighty;
From thence he shall come to judge the quick and the dead.

I believe in the Holy Ghost;
The holy Catholick Church;
The Communion of Saints;
The Forgiveness of sins;
The Resurrection of the body,
And the Life everlasting. Amen.

And after that these Prayers following, all devoutly kneeling: the Minister first pronouncing with a loud voice,

Minister: The Lord be with you.

Answer: And with thy spirit.

Let us pray.

All kneel

Lord, have mercy upon us.

Christ, have mercy upon us.

Lord, have mercy upon us.

Then the Minister, Clerks, and people shall say the Lord's Prayer with a loud voice:

OUR Father,
which art in heaven,
Hallowed be thy Name,
Thy kingdom come,
Thy will be done,
in earth as it is in heaven.
Give us this day our daily bread;
And forgive us our trespasses,
As we forgive them that trespass against us;
And lead us not into temptation,
But deliver us from evil. Amen.

Then the Priest standing up shall say:

O Lord, shew thy mercy upon us.

And grant us thy salvation.

O Lord, save the King.

And mercifully hear us when we call upon thee.

Endue thy Ministers with righteousness.

And make thy chosen people joyful.

O Lord, save thy people.

And bless thine inheritance.

Give peace in our time, O Lord.

Because there is none other that fighteth for us, but only thou, O God.

O God, make clean our hearts within us.

And take not thy Holy Spirit from us.

Then shall follow three Collects: The first of the day: The second for Peace: The third for Aid against all Perils, as hereafter followeth: which two last Collects shall be daily said at Evening Prayer without alteration.

The Collect for the Feast of All Saints:

O ALMIGHTY God, who hast knit together thine elect in one communion and fellowship, in the mystical body of thy Son Christ our Lord: Grant us grace so to follow thy blessed Saints in all virtuous and godly living, that we may come to those unspeakable joys, which thou hast prepared for them that unfeignedly love thee; through lesus Christ our Lord. Amen. **Amen.**

The Second Collect at Evening Prayer

O GOD, from whom all holy desires, all good counsels, and all just works do proceed: Give unto thy servants that peace which the world cannot give; that both our hearts may be set to obey thy commandments, and also that by thee we being defended from the fear of our enemies may pass our time in rest and quietness; through the merits of Jesus Christ our Saviour. **Amen.**

The Third Collect, for Aid against all Perils

LIGHTEN our darkness, we beseech thee, O Lord; and by thy great mercy defend us from all perils and dangers of this night; for the love of thy only Son, our Saviour, Jesus Christ. **Amen.**

In Quires and places where they sing here followeth the Anthem

Holy is the True Light, and passing wonderful, lending radiance to them that endured in the heat of the conflict, from Christ they inherit a home of unfading splendour, wherein they rejoice with gladness evermore.

ALMIGHTY and everlasting God, who alone workest great marvels: Send down upon our Bishops, [specially Philip, Bishop of this Diocese] and Curates, and all Congregations committed to their charge, the healthful Spirit of thy grace; and that they may truly please thee, pour upon them the continual dew of thy blessing.

We also pray thee this night, O Lord, to send thy bountiful blessing on all churches, schools and religious orders dedicated to Michael and all Angels, or who recognise St Michael as their Patron: especially the Sisters of the Church and the Society of the Sacred Mission. Grant this, O Lord, for the honour of our Advocate and Mediator, lesus Christ. **Amen.**

A Prayer of Saint [John] Chrysostom.

ALMIGHTY God, who hast given us grace at this time with one accord to make our common supplications unto thee; and dost promise that when two or three are gathered together in thy Name thou wilt grant their requests: Fulfil now, O Lord, the desires and petitions of thy servants, as may be most expedient for them; granting us in this world knowledge of thy truth, and in the world to come life everlasting. **Amen.**

THE grace of our Lord Jesus Christ, and the love of God, and the fellowship of the Holy Ghost, be with us all evermore. **Amen.**
