SETTING AT 10 A.M.

The Hadleigh Setting – Alan Ridout (1934–96)

The service begins on p. 119 of **A Prayer Book for Australia** ("The Green or Blue" book) At 10:00 a.m., we begin by standing to join the choir in singing the Lent Prose:

Hear us, O Lord, have mercy upon us: for we have sinned against thee.

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God, we implore thee, in thy glory seated: bow down and hearken to thy weeping children: pity and pardon all our grievous trespasses.

Hear us, O Lord, have mercy upon us: for we have sinned against thee.

COLLECT (OF THE DAY AND THE SEASON)

Lord our God, by your Holy Spirit write your commandments upon our hearts and grant us the wisdom and power of the cross, so that, cleansed from greed and selfishness, we may become a living temple of your love, through Jesus Christ our Lord.

Amen.

Almighty and everlasting God, you hate nothing that you have made, and you forgive the sins of all who are penitent: create and make in us new and contrite hearts, that we, worthily lamenting our sins, and acknowledging our wretchedness, may obtain of you, the God of all mercy, perfect remission and forgiveness; through Jesus Christ our Lord, who lives and reigns with you and the Holy Spirit, one God, now and forever. **Amen**.

FIRST READING Exodus 17:1–7

A reading from the book Exodus:

God spoke all these words and said:

I am the LORD your God, who brought you out of the land of Egypt, out of the house of slavery; you shall have no other gods before me.

You shall not make for yourself an idol, whether in the form of anything that is in heaven above, or that is on the earth beneath, or that is in the water under the earth. You shall not bow down to them or worship them; for I the LORD your God am a jealous God, punishing children for the iniquity of parents, to the third and the fourth generation of those who reject me, but showing steadfast love to the thousandth generation of those who love me and keep my commandments.

You shall not make wrongful use of the name of the LORD your God, for the LORD will not acquit anyone who misuses his name.

Remember the sabbath day, and keep it holy. For six days you shall labour and do all your work.

But the seventh day is a sabbath to the LORD your God;

you shall not do any work-

you, your son or your daughter, your male or female slave, your livestock, or the alien resident in your towns.

For in six days the LORD made heaven and earth, the sea, and all that is in them, but rested the seventh day;

therefore the LORD blessed the sabbath day and consecrated it.

Honour your father and your mother, so that your days may be long in the land that the LORD your God is giving you.

You shall not murder.

You shall not commit adultery.

You shall not steal.

You shall not bear false witness against your neighbour.

You shall not covet your neighbour's house; you shall not covet your neighbour's wife, or male or female slave, or ox, or donkey, or anything that belongs to your neighbour.

Hear the word of the Lord.

PSALM 19

Response (at 8 a.m.): You, Lord, have the words of eternal life.

SECOND READING

I Corinthians 1:18-25

A reading from the first letter of Paul to the Church in Corinth:

The message about the cross is foolishness to those who are perishing, but to us who are being saved it is the power of God. For it is written, 'I will destroy the wisdom of the wise, and the discernment of the discerning I will thwart.'

Where is the one who is wise? Where is the scribe?
Where is the debater of this age?
Has not God made foolish the wisdom of the world?
For since, in the wisdom of God, the world did not know God through wisdom, God decided, through the foolishness of our proclamation, to save those who believe.

For Jews demand signs and Greeks desire wisdom, but we proclaim Christ crucified, a stumbling-block to Jews and foolishness to Gentiles, but to those who are the called, both Jews and Greeks, Christ the power of God and the wisdom of God. For God's foolishness is wiser than human wisdom, and God's weakness is stronger than human strength.

Looking further ahead:

Our **Holy Week preacher** this year will be The Right Reverend Dr Stephen Pickard, sometime Principal of St Mark's Theological College, Canberra, and assistant bishop in the Diocese of Adelaide (amongst many other things). Bishop Stephen's will be presenting "Portraits of Discipleship": he will begin this on Palm Sunday (March 24), continue with an address in the eucharist each night of Holy Week, and also at the Good Friday liturgy and the liturgies of Easter Day.

In the Easter Season, we will have a series of Guest Preachers on the theme: "First Witnesses to the Resurrection: Women and the Easter faith". Every Sunday during the Easter season (though see below) will see an engaging woman preacher reflecting with us on the mystery and wonder of Easter. Preachers will include: Dr Meg Warner; Bishop Kate Prowd; Bishop Genieve Blackwell; Archdeacon Colleen O'Reilly, AM and will conclude on the Feast of Pentecost, when the preacher will be The Reverend Canon (Emerita) Professor Dorothy Lee, AM, FAHA

Patronal Festival

The one exception to the above is our Patronal Festival, which we will celebrate on Sunday April 28 (the fourth Sunday of Easter), where our preacher will be The Reverend Professor (Emeritus) Robert Gribben, AM. Professor Gribben is an internationally recognised (and awarded) liturgical scholar, and the chief author/compiler of *Uniting in Worship*. (He is frequently referred to as the UCA's Thomas Cranmer!) He is also a significant figure in International Ecumenical Dialogue – not least with the Orthodox Churches (He loves the Anglican church, too.) Given St George is regarded by the Orthodox as "The Great Martyr", Robert's insights will be inspiring, encouraging and helpfully challenging.

Book(s) Launch

On the evening of **Wednesday, April 17 at 6:00 p.m.**, St George's will host the launch of two newly published books by The Most Reverend Dr Peter Carnley, AC, sometime Archbishop of Perth and Primate of the Anglican Church of Australia. The titles of the two new books are: Arius on Carillon Avenue – More than a Memoir: A Trinitarian Saga and The Subordinate Substitute: Another Wrong Turn on Carillon Avenue. The books will be launched by The Reverend Professor (Emeritus) Christiaan Mostert – well-known in this parish – and in the presence of our own Archbishop and Mrs Freier. There will be food and festivities to enjoy. **Save the date.**
