# **FESTIVAL OF DEDICATION**

"On the twentieth day of December 1875 the Right Reverend the Bishop of Ballaarat at the request of the Very Reverend Hussey Burgh Macartney made on behalf of the Lord Bishop of Melbourne consecrated St George's Church Malvern.

This short note, in beautiful copper-plate hand-writing, appears in a register book in the archives of the Diocese of Melbourne (discovered by a former Registrar, now Church Warden, Malcolm Tadgell). Thus, 150 years (and one day) later, we gather, with the current Bishop of Ballarat, to give thanks to God for this Church building, those who have worshipped in it, and the witness it has provided to Malvern, and the wider Diocese and City of Melbourne (and beyond) in those years.

The building has been here for more than 150 years, of course: many in today's congregation will remember the 150<sup>th</sup> Anniversary of the Church at which former Vicar, and then Bishop of Bendigo, Andrew Curnow, preached some years ago. But a church can only be 'consecrated' when all the bills have been paid, and the church is therefore safe from being repossessed. This is crucial, because for a building to be 'consecrated' or 'dedicated' means that it is 'to be set aside permanently and exclusively for public worship'; with specific rites the building becomes set apart, devoted to God and to a sacred purpose.

With great joy, therefore, we gather to give thanks that this building, and those who have worshipped and continue to worship here, are dedicated to God – Father, Son and Holy Spirit: worshipping in liturgies and daily life, sharing with people in Malvern and beyond a glimpse of the beauty, compassion, love and welcome that God offers to and makes present in the world.

I Peter 2:4-10

A reading from the first letter of Peter:

Come to the Lord, a living stone, though rejected by mortals yet chosen and precious in God's sight, and like living stones, let yourselves be built into a spiritual house, to be a holy priesthood, to offer spiritual sacrifices acceptable to God through Jesus Christ. For it stands in scripture:

'See, I am laying in Zion a stone, a cornerstone chosen and precious; and whoever believes in him will not be put to shame.'

To you then who believe, he is precious; but for those who do not believe,

'The stone that the builders rejected has become the very head of the corner',

and

'A stone that makes them stumble, and a rock that makes them fall.'

# The Nicene Creed

On the third day he rose again in accordance with the Scriptures; he ascended into heaven and is seated at the right hand of the Father. # THE LITURGY OF THE SACRAMENT

The gifts are set up on the altar and the Bishop offers prayers, to which the people respond:

Blessed be God for ever.

The Bishop then begins the Great Thanksgiving Prayer

The Lord be with you.

And also with you.

Lift up your hearts.

We lift them to the Lord.

Let us give thanks to the Lord our God.

It is right to give our thanks and praise.

The Bishop continues with a prayer appropriate to the day, concluding with:

... we proclaim your great and glorious name, for ever praising you and saying:

Holy, holy, holy Lord, God of power and might, Heaven and earth are full of your glory. Hosanna in the highest.

Blessed is he who comes in the name of the Lord. Hosanna in the highest.

The Bishop continues the prayer of consecration until:

Let us proclaim the mystery of faith: Christ has died, Christ is risen. Christ will come again.

The Bishop continues the prayer, which concludes:

...we worship you, Father, in songs of never-ending praise:

Blessing and honour and glory and power are yours for ever and ever. Amen.

Silence is kept

As our Saviour Christ has taught us, we are confident to pray:

Our Father in heaven,
 hallowed be your name,
 your kingdom come,
 your will be done,
 on earth as in heaven.

Give us today our daily bread.

Forgive us our sins
 as we forgive those who sin against us.

Save us from the time of trial
 and deliver us from evil.

For the kingdom, the power, and the glory are yours,
now and for ever. Amen.






# **Notices**
