




St James, Apostle and Martyr
25 July 2021



*Jesus called James, the son of Zebedee and his brother John.
Immediately they left their father in the boat and followed Jesus.
(c.f. Mark 1: 19, 20)*

*We acknowledge the Boon Wurrung and Wurundjeri people of the Kulin nation

James, often called 'the Great' or 'the Greater' (to distinguish him from James, son of Alphaeus, another of the Apostles), was a Galilean fisherman, son of Zebedee who, with his brother John, was one of the first disciples called by Jesus. The two brothers, with Peter, were with Jesus at his Transfiguration, and again were asked by Jesus to 'keep awake' in the Garden of Gethsemane.

James was the first of the Apostles put to death – under the orders of Herod Agrippa (who had also killed John the Baptist). This is believed to have occurred as early as 44.

Despite the indications in *The Acts of the Apostles* that none of the apostles left Jerusalem until *after* James's death, since the 7th century it has been alleged that, before his martyrdom, James travelled to Spain to preach the gospel there. In Spain, from the 9th century, it has also been asserted that James's 'remains' were translated to Santiago de Compostela – and the city (named for Saint James – Iago in Spanish) and its Basilica became the third great pilgrimage site of the mediaeval West: after Jerusalem and Rome. Owing to this link with pilgrimage, James is often shown (as above) carrying a staff. And, because of the prevalence of scallops on the coast near Santiago, a scallop shell became the traditional symbol of pilgrimage in Western Europe. James usually has one of those too, and he wears a pilgrim's hat. He also usually carries a book of the gospels – because he brought the gospel to Spain.

Let us give thanks to the Lord our God.

It is right to give our thanks and praise.

The President continues with a prayer appropriate to the season, concluding with:

Therefore with angels and archangels,
and with all the company of heaven,
we proclaim your great and glorious name,
for ever praising you and saying:

**Holy, holy. Holy Lord, God of power and might,
Heaven and earth are full of your glory.**

Hosanna in the highest.

Blessed is he who comes in the name of the Lord.

Hosanna in the highest.

The President continues the prayer until:

Let us proclaim the mystery of faith:

Christ has died,

Christ is risen.

Christ will come again.

The President continues the prayer, which concludes:

...we worship you, Father, in songs of never-ending praise:

**Blessing and honour and glory and power
are yours for ever and ever. Amen.**

Silence is kept.

As our Saviour Christ has taught us, we are confident to pray:

**Our Father in heaven,
hallowed be your name,
your kingdom come,
your will be done,
on earth as in heaven.
Give us today our daily bread.
Forgive us our sins
as we forgive those who sin against us.
Save us from the time of trial
and deliver us from evil.
For the kingdom, the power, and the glory are yours,
now and for ever. Amen.**

THE BREAKING OF THE BREAD AND THE COMMUNION

As the President breaks the bread, the following is said:

which have been gathered together and made one bread.

Brothers and sisters in Christ,
as we come to the Holy Communion of the body and blood
of our Saviour Christ,
the current restrictions on gathering mean that we cannot do
what we would normally do, and physically share in the bread and wine
in remembrance of Christ's body broken and blood shed for us.
Nonetheless, we can and should still participate spiritually.
As we join in the celebration of this sacrament:
“if we come with a penitent heart and lively faith,
we spiritually eat the flesh of Christ and drink his blood;
we dwell in Christ and he in us;
we are one with Christ and Christ with us” –
even when, as now, we are unable to consume the bread and wine
physically.
Yet, in faith and hope, we look forward to the time
when we can gather again together to partake physically
in the sacrament and in communion with each other.

*During this time, all are encouraged to make what is traditionally called
'spiritual communion'. To assist in this, you might use one of the following
prayers:*

PRAYERS OF SPIRITUAL RECEPTION

Lord Jesus, I believe that you are truly present in the Holy Sacrament,
and, since I cannot at this time receive communion physically,
I pray you to come into my heart.
I unite myself with you and embrace you with all my heart, my soul,
and my mind.
Let nothing separate me from you;
let me serve you in this life until, by your grace,
I come to your glorious kingdom and unending peace. Amen.

Come Lord Jesus, and dwell in my heart in the fullness of your strength;
be my wisdom and guide me in right pathways;
conform my life and actions to the image of your holiness;
and, in the power of your gracious might,
rule over every hostile power that threatens
or disturbs the growth of your kingdom,
who with the Father and the Holy Spirit, lives and reigns,
one God, in glory everlasting. Amen.

After Communion, silence is kept.

REFLECTIONS ON THE LECTIONS

*'People are saints not because of what they achieve, but because of their acceptance of failure. A saint is one who conforms to Christ, and what Jesus is about was shown not in his successes, his cures and miracles and brilliant parables and preaching, but in his "failure", his defeat on the cross, when he died deserted by his followers and with all his life's work in ruins.'*¹

So writes the remarkably astute Dominican theologian, Herbert McCabe. Our gospel this morning (and, indeed, each of the readings we hear today) shows that those who follow Jesus need to undertake a profound reconsideration of what we mean by 'success' or 'failure', what we mean by 'honour' and 'dishonour', how we understand 'greatness'.

According to Matthew's gospel, the mother of James and John asks Jesus for the seats of honour when his kingdom comes. Mark puts the request in the mouths of the brothers themselves. It is almost as if Matthew is trying to 'preserve the honour' of two of Jesus' chief disciples – let their mother take the blame for such a bold request. (Luke omits this story altogether). In both gospel accounts, however, the request gives Jesus an opportunity to tell all of the twelve (and all subsequent disciples who hear this story) that how they – and we – understand 'greatness' will need to be completely reshaped.

It is the same message that God tells Jeremiah to pass on to Baruch, and to all who hear what Jeremiah has to say: "Do not seek great things for yourself". Why? Because what the world counts as glorious, great and wonderful will finally be seen as nothing. That, too, is why Paul reminds his hearers that 'we have this treasure in clay jars so that it may be made clear that this extraordinary power belongs to God and does not come from us.' True greatness, all our readings make clear, is to be seen when God brings about God's transformation of all things – chiefly, in the resurrection of Jesus.

Paul reminds us, therefore, that while we may – as many are now – suffer afflictions, perplexity, persecution, hardships; or even the dreariness, frustration and boredom of another lockdown, we are not abandoned nor forsaken. The God who brings life from death is still at work, still bringing about the restoration of all things, not least realigning our understanding of the things that are really important and great. So, like Jesus, let us 'hand over' to God all of our own 'failings', our impatience, our fears. And, like James and all the saints, let us seek God in these realities, rather than in the things we think are important, and find ourselves transformed and raised with Christ.
