REFLECTION ON THE LECTIONS

Recently, there has been a deal of talk about 'misinformation': people putting about in various media comments or statements that are either completely untrue or misunderstandings of reality. Christians are not immune from such misunderstandings. One of the remarkably persistent forms of 'misinformation' amongst Christians is what is (very) loosely called 'the doctrine of Papal infallibility'! For all the discussion of (and negative reaction to) this promulgation of the First Vatican Council, the surprising reality is that it is a 'doctrine' that has only been used twice. As a wise Jesuit once said, "Popes know all the carry on they have to go through in order to speak infallibly; given that, it's a wonder they've ever bothered to do it at all!"

Curiously, in both instances when a Pope has spoken infallibly, it has been to say something about the Blessed Virgin Mary. In 1950, the second time, Pope Pius XII decreed that it was an infallible teaching of the Church that the Blessed Virgin, "having completed the course of her earthly life, was assumed body and soul into heavenly glory". In reality, that was simply confirming a belief – never fully codified or defined – that had been around since around the 6th century. The belief was that, at the end of her earthly life, Mary entered the joy of her Son and Lord, and joined the host of all the faithful in heaven: short-hand for this became that Mary was 'Assumed' into heaven. The 'Feast of the Assumption of the Blessed Virgin Mary' continued, as it had been for centuries, to be held on August 15.

Unsurprisingly, neither Orthodox nor Anglican Christians (for the most part), were especially happy about this. The Orthodox preferred to keep the older Greek name (derived from St Paul's first letter to the Corinthians) of 'The Dormition (i.e. falling asleep) of the All Holy Theotokos (God-bearer)'; Anglicans (together with some Lutherans) settled on 'Mary, Mother of the Lord'. Both celebrations felt the Roman Catholic 'definition' was making a great mystery too concrete – though, in fact, the official teaching isn't quite as 'concrete' as most people seem to think: another piece of 'misinformation' or a mistaken assumption (if you'll pardon the pun!).

Taking a cue from the Orthodox, perhaps it is helpful to think that in 'falling asleep' (c.f. I Corinthians I 1:30; 15:6), Mary continues to serve as a model of discipleship. Just as she was the first to receive the coming of Jesus – and in a unique way, within her own body – so her 'falling asleep' in God, and being present now and for eternity in the nearer presence of God, is a foreshadowing of all that will happen to those who, like her, say 'Yes' to God's work in Christ in our lives. Let us pray that, like her, we may, by the grace of God, be faithful throughout our lives. And let us pray that, again like her, the power of the Holy Spirit may come upon us so that we, too, may be 'God bearers' to the world.

GATHERING IN GOD'S NAME

Almighty God, to whom all hearts are open, all desires known, and from whom no secrets are hidden: cleanse the thoughts of our hearts by the inspiration of your Holy Spirit, that we may perfectly love you, and worthily magnify your holy name, through Christ our Lord. Amen.

We say together:

Lord, have mercy. Christ have mercy. Lord have mercy. Glory to God in the highest, and peace to God's people on earth. Lord God, heavenly King, almighty God and Father, we worship you, we give you thanks, we praise you for your glory.

Lord Jesus Christ, only Son of the Father Lord God, Lamb of God, you take away the sin of the world: have mercy on us; you are seated at the right hand of the Father: receive our prayer.

For you alone are the Holy One, you alone are the Lord, you alone are the Most High, Jesus Christ, with the Holy Spirit, in the glory of God the Father. Amen.

Let us pray.

The people pray silently, and then the President 'collects' the silent prayer:

Loving God, who chose the blessed Virgin Mary to be the mother of your incarnate Son: grant that we, who are redeemed by his blood, may share with her in the glory of your eternal kingdom; through Jesus Christ our Lord, who lives and reigns with you in the unity of the Holy Spirit, one God, now and for ever. **Amen**.

Lift up your hearts. We lift them to the Lord.

Let us give thanks to the Lord our God. It is right to give our thanks and praise.

The President continues with a prayer appropriate to the season, concluding with:

Therefore with angels and archangels, and with all the company of heaven, we proclaim your great and glorious name, for ever praising you and saying:

Holy, holy. Holy Lord, God of power and might, Heaven and earth are full of your glory. Hosanna in the highest.

Blessed is he who comes in the name of the Lord. Hosanna in the highest.

The President continues the prayer until:

Let us proclaim the mystery of faith: Christ has died, Christ is risen. Christ will come again. The President continues the prayer, which concludes:

...we worship you, Father, in songs of never-ending praise:

Blessing and honour and glory and power are yours for ever and ever. Amen.

Silence is kept.

As our Saviour Christ has taught us, we are confident to pray:

Our Father in heaven, hallowed be your name, your kingdom come, your will be done, on earth as in heaven. Give us today our daily bread. Forgive us our sins as we forgive those who sin against us. Save us from the time of trial and deliver us from evil. For the kingdom, the power, and the glory are yours, now and for ever. Amen.

THE BREAKING OF THE BREAD AND THE COMMUNION

As the President breaks the bread, the following is said:

As this broken bread was once many grains which have been gathered together and made one bread.

So may your Church be gathered from the ends of the earth into your kingdom.

The gifts of God for the people of God.

Brothers and sisters in Christ, as we come to the Holy Communion of the body and blood of our Saviour Christ. current restrictions on gathering mean we cannot do what we would normally do, and physically share in the bread and wine in remembrance of Christ's body broken and blood shed for us. Nonetheless, we can and should still participate spiritually. As we join in the celebration of this sacrament: "if we come with a penitent heart and lively faith, we spiritually eat the flesh of Christ and drink his blood; we dwell in Christ and he in us: we are one with Christ and Christ with us" even when, as now, we are unable to consume the bread and wine physically. Yet, in faith and hope, we look forward to the time when we can gather again together to partake physically in the sacrament and in communion with each other.

During this time, all are encouraged to make what is traditionally called 'spiritual communion'. To assist in this, you might use one of the following prayers:

PRAYERS OF SPIRITUAL RECEPTION

Lord Jesus, I believe that you are truly present in the Holy Sacrament, and, since I cannot at this time receive communion physically,

I pray you to come into my heart.

I unite myself with you and embrace you with all my heart, my soul, and my mind.

Let nothing separate me from you;

let me serve you in this life until, by your grace,

I come to your glorious kingdom and unending peace. Amen.

Come Lord Jesus, and dwell in my heart in the fullness of your strength; be my wisdom and guide me in right pathways;

conform my life and actions to the image of your holiness;

and, in the power of your gracious might,

rule over every hostile power that threatens

or disturbs the growth of your kingdom,

who with the Father and the Holy Spirit, lives and reigns,

one God, in glory everlasting. Amen.

After Communion, silence is kept.

A prayer is offered by the President, which ends

we offer ourselves to you as a living sacrifice, through Jesus Christ our Lord. Send us out in the power of your Spirit to live and work to your praise and glory.
